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INTRODUCTION

Preferred by Nature (former name: NEPCon) is an international, non-profit organisation that delivers sustainability services and engages in innovation projects to facilitate the transformation of business practices and consumer behaviour to promote the responsible use of natural resources. Around 1,300 Chain of Custody-certified clients benefit from our over 15 years of experience in providing services to the forest supply chain sectors – including timber processing and manufacturing companies, printing houses, publishers, paper merchants, traders and retailers of all sizes.

Through a well-developed network of regional representatives and contractors, Preferred by Nature offers timely and cost-effective certification services around the world.

The purpose of this report is to document performance of *Jilin Chemical Fiber Stock CO.,LTD* hereafter referred to as "Company", against the requirements of the Verification Framework and Guidelines, (September 2021 version¹) and related guidance documents² developed by Canopy and approved, supported and requested by the Fashion and Textile Leaders for Forest Conservation (Leaders Group)³ and the over 500 brands, retailers and designers looking to implement their sourcing policies for man-made cellulosic textiles. The focus of this verification audit is to manage the risk and avoid sourcing from ancient and endangered forests and other controversial sources and implement other sustainable sourcing measures, across the supply chain from the point of wood harvesting in forests and/or plantations and through to the brand and retail customers. Man-made cellulosic fibre (MMCF) producers, are required to document and provide evidence towards a set of pre-defined social and environmental criteria and key progress indicators as part of the CanopyStyle initiative.

The audit presents the findings of Preferred by Nature auditors who have evaluated company systems and performance against the applicable standard(s). Section 4 below provides the evaluation conclusions. The auditor reviewed and used Canopy's map of ancient and endangered forests, which has been overlaid with the sourcing regions and list of suppliers of the company to assess the level of risk, as well as further guidance document such as the Dissolving Pulp Classification Tool and the Advice Note on Ancient and Endangered Forests⁴.

1. GENERAL DESCRIPTION

1.1 Company overview

Jilin Chemical Fiber Stock Co., **Ltd**. is a holding subsidiary of Jilin Chemical Fiber Stock Co., Ltd. The company was founded in 1960 and put into operation on August 1, 1964.

The company is a listed company specializing in the production of viscose fibre. Its main products are viscose filament and viscose staple yarn. The designed annual production capacity for filament fibre is 80,000 tons and for the staple fibre is 125,000 tons. The company is one of the top ten enterprises in China's chemical fibre industry.

From 1996 to 2022, the company has progressively reconstructed and launched several technical transformation projects for viscose filament, each with different annual output capacities. The company's viscose fiber (filament and staple fiber) business covers five continents including Europe and the United States, Japan and South Korea, India and Pakistan, Southeast Asia, West Asia, Africa, and Oceania. The company's filament yarns focus on high quality. According to the 2022 sustainability report, the proportion of exports continued to rise. The high-end market share of the products exceeded 45%, with downstream customers spread across more than 20 provinces, municipalities, and autonomous regions in China, as well as 24 countries and regions globally. The company's short fiber segment focuses on differentiation, making it unique in the regenerated cellulose fiber industry, and exports to 28 countries and regions.

The company's "Baishan" brand trademark was rated as a well-known trademark in China. In 2007, the "Baishan" viscose filament won the honour of "China Famous Brand". The company has been rated as "National Customer Satisfaction Enterprise", "National Advanced Enterprise of Quality and Efficiency", "Top 500 Chinese Enterprises Informatization" and many other honours.

- 1.2 Company scope (sites, locations, etc) Jilin Chemical Fiber Stock Co., Ltd purchases raw material, manufactures and sales of MMCF. The headquarters is responsible for development and enforcement of the company sourcing policy and purchasing raw materials for the mil.
- 1.3 Company sourcing policy The Company updated and published their Fibre Procurement Policy for Protecting Forests being effective on March 2023 and committed to:
 - Conserve Ancient and Endangered Forests and intact forest landscapes.



- Recognize, respect and uphold human rights of communities
- Innovative and alternative fibre development
- Advocacy for conservation solutions
- Forest certification
- Transparency, traceability and verification
- Reduce greenhouse gap footprint

3.3 Description of Overall Audit Process

The audit officially started on 6 - Mar -2024. The auditor started contacting the Company by requiring relevant documentation based on the latest CanopyStyle audit guidelines and framework.

The Company sent over a number of documents such as sourcing policy, organizational chart in implementing the policy, standard operation manual, communication with suppliers on sourcing requirements, risk assessments with evidence for the reporting period (01-Mar-2023 to 31-May-2024) for all suppliers, procurement data, sales data, update on innovative and alternative fiber, evidence on conservation, evidence on social issues from suppliers, etc.

In the meantime, the auditor also communicated and cross-checked with the Company over any issues and questions occurred during the review process. As there are eleven dissolving pulp suppliers supplying as well as one supplier providing recycled cotton pulp, the auditor needed to review the documentation for each supplier's related documentation, especially on the risk assessments.

During the initial review phase, auditor detected that the purchasing evidence provided was not at a sufficient level, i.e. only provided a few purchasing invoices, therefore, auditor asked for more detailed purchasing documents samples from all declared suppliers. The company provided the required documentation.

On 18-June-2024, the auditors conducted the on-site audit at the corporate office, with the presence of management representative and the key staff from relevant departments from the corporate office. During the opening meeting, the objective and scope of the audit, agenda, conflict of interest (COI) issues, etc were communicated. The management representative gave a brief introduction of the company and operation activities and the efforts made on Canopy sourcing policy. The auditor then shared major findings from reviewing the documentation.

Following the opening meeting, the auditor interviewed the management team regarding action plan and any updates in regard of practices with Canopy policy commitment, Company structure, Canopy training, purchase policy, supplier management, research of alternative Fibre, environment protection, forest protection, etc.

After interview with management, related documents were reviewed, such as Wood Fibre Sourcing Policy and Operational Procedures, Annual Volume Summary Data, purchase documents (contracts, invoices, packing list, bill of lading etc.), Risk Assessment Report, Training records, communication with the suppliers, etc.



Then, the auditor toured the company's mill(s) including the production line(s) and warehouse(s). When touring the warehouse(s), the auditor checked on the mill's input and output records, storage for the pulp in use.

In combination with reviewing documents and visiting the company's facilities, the auditors interviewed the staff from various departments, including product department, sourcing department, etc.

The closing meeting was held on the same day. The auditors gave a summary of the meeting, raised issues and acquired for additional further information within two weeks' time after the meeting. The Company provided further required additional documentation at a later stage as well as responded to some of the major concerns,. For details please refer to the report findings.

4. EVALUATION RESULT

4.1 Evaluation Conclusion

Positive Findings:

The company has been implementing the sourcing policy in line with CanopyStyle initiative.

A standard operation procedure (SOP) has been developed by the HQ to implement the Policy as well as monitor on the suppliers' performance. The standard operation procedure is shared with the mills.

The Company has also developed capacity as well as organizational structure in implementing the Policy. Management team as well as the production site managers are trained how to implement the policy and procedure.

The Company keeps communicating about this policy with all suppliers.

The dissolving pulp suppliers list was made publicly on the Company's official website and the Company has agreed to share the risk assessment of suppliers with the Leaders

Group.

The Company has made significant improvements in their systems to comply with the CanopyStyle audit, particularly in the areas of Leadership Group engagement, risk assessment, and commitments to increase the FSC certified materials.



The company has increased its use of FSC raw materials and plans to further increase FSC raw material usage over the next three years.

The company is actively providing Canopy-related training to all employees, including production and warehouse staff.

The Company has been developing fibre by using recycled cotton. Different percentage of recycled cotton has been put into use.

Areas for Improvement:

The Company made significant attempts to collect information from their suppliers on forest or plantation of origin, and during this audit some suppliers disclosed their forest level info to a detailed manner where sourcing areas are identified, others disclosed up to sub-regional/country level, while some didn't reveal their forest level info. Therefore, origin of material for suppliers who is only known at a sub-regional/country level or from unknown region, creating a broad sourcing area with potential overlap with Ancient and Endangered Forests. However, the company's sourcing follows the guidance provided in the DP classification tool.

As to whether company is sourcing from controversial sources, there are FSC certified, FSC Controlled Wood claimed, PEFC Controlled Sources and non-certified pulp supplied to the company. Therefore there is no guarantee that all wood chips are not from other controversial sources. Company shall extend the evaluation on controversial sources from each supplier.

In terms of whether the wood comes from forest/plantation where there has been no conversion of natural forest to plantations, although some suppliers provide their sourcing policy or commitment, no solid evidence was provided from the Company as well as from the suppliers except their products' FSC certificate status. Company shall work further to gather solid evidence from supplier in this regard.

The company has a procedure to prevent sourcing from tropical peatlands and/or intact forest landscapes. Although there are FSC certified and FSC CW sourced material supplied to the Company, both FSC certified and FSC CW sourced material could be sourced from peatlands and IFLs. In addition, there is non-certified dissolving pulp supplied as well, where the commitment of not sourcing from tropical peatlands and/or IFLs cannot be guaranteed.

Canopy shared an advice note (effective 1 June 2019) that introduces a new tool (Dissolving Pulp Mill Classification) to be used in addition to the Forest Mapper when conducting risk assessments for sourcing from ancient and endangered forests. The new tool outlines commonly used dissolving pulp mills and a determination of risk considering priority ancient and endangered forests. Below please find the results comparison between the company internal risk assessment conducted for 2022 and the Canopy Dissolving Pulp Classification Tool:

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The company conducted the assessment based on the evidence collected from the suppliers as well as the Dissolving Pulp Classification Tool and ForestMapper.

The Company has made great efforts to conduct a risk assessment on sourcing from Ancient and Endangered Forests, and more assessment is needed for controversial sources.

According to Supplier Management Operations Manual of the company, the supplier monitoring and evaluation system incorporates additional criteria based on documents obtained from dissolving pulp mills or suppliers. The sourcing country information for each pulp mill or supplier is available on the sourcing information. The company utilized the Supplier Evaluation Form to assess each supplier in terms of forest risk, respect for human rights and social responsibility, sourcing from tropical peatlands. Some suppliers confirmed they don't source from plantations. Some provided their wood fibre policy on plantation. By checking the pulp purchasing documents, there are non-certified pulp purchased from the company.

Summary:

The company provided a sourcing information form containing details such as pulp mill names, volumes and percentages from each pulp supplier, species information, and certification status of purchased pulp. Most dissolving pulp mills or suppliers have disclosed detailed forest-level information, specifying their sourcing areas. Some have provided information down to the sub-regional or country level, while others have not disclosed forest-level details. AustroCel Hallein GmbH, Borregaard, Sappi Papier Holding GmbH, Lenzing Biocell, and Celulosa Arauco Y Constitucion did not provide a map of their sourcing areas.

The company used the Supplier Evaluation Form to assess each supplier based on forest risk, respect for human rights and social responsibility, sourcing from tropical peatlands, intact forest landscapes, and supply quality. Additionally, the assessment relied on evidence gathered from suppliers and the Dissolving Pulp Classification Tool.

The company shared its assessment with Canopy and has permission to share it with the Leaders Group. The company published its supplier list on its website.

Caima is part of Altri Group and Forest certification is a priority for Altri. The company has voluntarily adhered to the two international forest management and chain of custody certification systems, FSC* and PEFC[™].

Altri Forest's are managed in a way to guarantee sustainability in the economic, ecological and social aspects, since its activity is mainly directed to the production of eucalyptus wood with high levels of quality and competitiveness.

Altri promotes the forestry certification of its partners and suppliers of raw material, providing the necessary technical support for the training and operation of forest producers.

In 2018, Altri Wood Supply acquired 57% of FSC* and PEFC[™] certified wood for the Group's three industrial units (including **Caima**), an increase of around 3% over 2017, reflecting its commitment to continuous improvement.

Regarding the origin of the wood supply for **Caima** mill, It's 100% based on the eucalyptus plantations located in Portugal and focused on the districts contiguous to the mill (as presented in the map – nance - Wood Supply to Caima – Total 2018).

Fujian Qingshan paper:

All sourcing bamboo pulp is from Fujian NanPing SanMing wild bamboo forest and not involved in any protection area.

The company required all suppliers to disclose the plantation establishment information. Some suppliers have stated, through wood fiber procurement policies or similar statements, that they do not source from plantations. According to sourcing information excel and pulp purchasing documents, it revealed that the pulp sourced from Caima, Lenzing, Södra and part of Fujian Qingshan paper are not certified. The only forest certification that guarantees no conversion to plantations after 1994 is FSC 100%. This indicator is graded as "in progress" because not all suppliers could demonstrate that their material does not originate from plantations, and not all suppliers provided solid evidence regarding plantations.

The company gives preference to the FSC certified pulp and there are both FSC certified and FSC CW claimed material supplied to the Company, in addition, the Company is planning to increase the intake of FSC certified pulp.
FSC can help reduce the risk/probability of material from intact forest landscapes or on drained tropical peatlands, although there is still possibility that certified material still could be sourced from peatlands and IFLs as FSC gives exemptions (for example, when they are not classified as HCV; the converted area is very limited).

The Fiber Procurement Policy requires suppliers to reduce their greenhouse gas emissions. The Supplier Management Operations Manual mandates that dissolving pulp suppliers provide an implementation plan for reducing emissions, detailing measures and evidence of performance. While most supplier contracts include statements about greenhouse gas reduction except Domsjö Fabriker AB and Fujian Qingshan Paper, indicating the commitment is still in progress. Additionally, there is no standard operating procedure for carbon footprint reduction.

The company uses a Supplier Evaluation Form to assess suppliers on forest risk, human rights, social responsibility, and sourcing from tropical peatlands.

Suppliers are evaluated and categorized into four levels: A (excellent), B (good), C (qualified), and D (unqualified). Level A suppliers may receive increased purchase volume or priority, Level B may see increased purchase amounts or certain priority, Level C can be purchased from normally, and Level D will be removed from the supplier network.

Appendix C: RECOMMENDATIONS FOR IMPROVEMENT

Canopy applauds Jilin Chemical Fiber for completing its third CanopyStyle audit. The audit shows that the company has developed standard operating procedures to implement its policy, and monitor its suppliers. It has also increased the use of FSC Mix and FSC 100% since the last audit. Jilin Chemical Fiber is at low risk of sourcing from Ancient and Endangered Forests.

The CanopyStyle audit is a learning opportunity, and in the spirit of continuous improvement, actions can be taken over time to more thoroughly implement the company's policy commitments. Based on the review of the audit report, Canopy recommends the following next steps:

- Conduct more detailed supplier verification related to all categories of controversial sources;
- Seek additional evidence from suppliers related to plantation dates;
- Implement the action plan to increase the use of FSC certified fibre inputs;
- Continue to scale-up commercial products containing Next Generation alternative fibres;
- With support from Canopy, continue to support advocacy actions for the conservation of key priority forest regions;
- Continue to adopt best in class processing technologies. Work with experts in the field to implement
 pollution control technologies to limit their impact. Implement the new ZDHC MMCF guidelinesⁱ for
 chemical management, which give suppliers unified criteria for measuring output indicators like
 wastewater, sludge, air emissions and other process- related parameters.

We recommend that the company develop an action plan for these priority issues, so that they can be addressed before the next annual audit.

As mentioned in the CanopyStyle audit framework, ongoing audits and/or random site visits will support Jilin Chemical Fiber to continue to implement their policy and meet the expectations of the CanopyStyle Initiative.

Once again, we congratulate you for the completion of your third audit and for proactively taking steps to implement your CanopyStyle policy. We look forward to working collaboratively with Jilin Chemical Fiber to address any outstanding issues.
